A well-stocked first aid kit should include prescription medications for common emergencies that may occur before veterinary help arrives.

1. NSAID FOR ABDOMINAL PAIN AND OCULAR INFLAMMATION

Purpose: For emergency use when a horse shows signs of colic (abdominal pain) or acute eye inflammation, before veterinary examination is possible. Most commonly: flunixin meglumine (Banamine).

Rationale: Colic can progress rapidly. Having an appropriate NSAID available allows the owner to provide initial pain relief while contacting their veterinarian. This medication also manages ocular pain.

Owner advised: Owner has been advised: always call vet before administering; do not re-dose without guidance; this drug can mask signs of surgical colic. Withhold feed until vet advises.

2. NSAID FOR MUSCULOSKELETAL PAIN AND ACUTE INJURY

Purpose: For acute lameness, soft tissue injury, or musculoskeletal pain. A different NSAID from Category 1 is recommended so the owner has the appropriate drug for the clinical scenario. Most commonly: phenylbutazone.

Rationale: Musculoskeletal injuries are among the most common equine emergencies. Prompt anti-inflammatory treatment reduces pain and secondary tissue damage while awaiting veterinary evaluation.

Owner advised: Owner has been advised: never combine two NSAIDs; monitor for GI and renal side effects; follow prescribed dose and duration carefully.

3. BROAD-SPECTRUM ORAL ANTIBIOTIC FOR INTERIM USE

Purpose: For use under veterinary guidance when a horse sustains a wound or develops an infection and veterinary examination will be delayed. Please prescribe whatever antibiotic you prefer for this patient.

Rationale: Timely antibiotic administration for contaminated wounds and suspected infections can significantly improve outcomes. This is a bridge medication until you can examine the horse.

Owner advised: Owner has been advised: always call vet before administering any antibiotic; all antibiotics carry risk of colitis (diarrhea); discontinue and contact vet immediately if diarrhea develops.
